Former Prime Minister of Nepal



The Chairperson of the opening session of ARF 20th Anniversary, President and board members of the international advisory council of ARF, Staff members of the secretariat, Distinguished guests from Asia and other continents, Ladies and Gentlemen

Let me first of all extend my heartiest congratulations on the solemn occasion of the 20th anniversary of the ARF. I am pleased to bring the message of peace, solidarity and greetings from the people of Nepal who are wedded to the principles of peace, non-violence and global fraternity as propounded by Lord Buddha, an immortal son of Nepal.

This is an important occasion to review progress of the organization in the context of its serious engagement in such diverse areas of education, health, integrated development, emergency relief and humanitarian activities in 15 countries in Asia, Africa and Middle East that can be taken as a significant milestone for ARF.

It is heartening to know that in the last seven years ARF has supported more than 16,000 children, provided humanitarian assistance to more than 4,00,000 disaster affected people, 3,000 plus refugees and asylum seekers, and trained 1,259 young female and male activists and potential young leaders. ARF deserves our warm appreciation and continued support in its quest for betterment of mankind.

The practice of extending humanitarian assistance is deeply rooted in Asian culture and traditions. People in our part of the world consider their bounden duty to extend such support in difficult times. It is true that in the past such activities were not made in a coordinated manner and were mostly sporadic as we did not have organized and professional organizations in Asia. But things have taken a positive turn and changed in the last three decades as professional NGOs have been carrying out such activities. However, such endeavours have one serious limitation in the sense that these activities were mostly dependent on funding support from Western countries. ARF is an exception in the sense that it is uniquely placed to assume its role to serve Asia and beyond rather independently.

It is gratifying to note that ARF has been extending support in Nepal in various ways particularly in the field of support for education of children, scholarship for undergraduate students and emergency relief and reconstruction activities through its Nepal chapter.

I have long been engaged in national politics including framing of constitution, parliamentary exercise and government. I had the opportunity to lead my party for a record period and also assumed the post of Prime Minister leading the country at a crucial time and even took the role of leader of opposition. While Nepal has passed through a period of difficult political transition that involved systemic changes both in the polity of the country from a monarchy to republic and restructuring the country from the existing

system of unitary rule to that of federal structure, I had to stake at times my own political and personal life for the ultimate good of the country.

From my own political experience, I understand how important it is to change the mindset of the people, develop new generation of leaderships, promote responsive and accountable political structure and bring about transformation in governance. This is a big challenge and the process is rather slow, so the complementary role of NGOs, social action and advocacy groups is of immense importance.

#### Distinguished Friends and Ladies and Gentlemen,

On this momentous occasion, I am also pleased to learn about the International Institute of Peace and Development Studies (IIPDS) and its most positive role in offering important academic and training courses for participants coming from Asia and other continents representing various faiths, religions and cultures. It provides a broader space for south–south and north-south dialogue and forging people to people solidarity.

The international landscape has become more complicated and complex in recent years. Besides recurring problem of terrorism, we are witnessing growing menace of extremism, sectarianism, war, death, destruction, poverty and undernourishment, touching plight of refugees, etc. It is, therefore, very important to promote and nurture compassion and humanitarian care for those who are compelled to leave their homes and forced take shelter in another country.

It is very important for us to promote intra- and inter-faith, intra- and inter-ethnic, intra- and inter-cultural understanding and accommodation to promote global cooperation and understanding. In the absence of peace and stability, it is hard to achieve sustainable development as we have experienced in Nepal that has passed through tumultuous times in the last decade with several twists and turns ranging from insurgency to peace process.

#### Distinguished Participants and Friends,

In my own assessment, ARF is quite dynamic and has been addressing a host of issues. It has been courageously addressing present day challenge, developing a new generation of leaders and reaching out to those who are in dire need of support. ARF committed as it is for such benevolent activities, deserves our whole-hearted support and solidarity.

To conclude, I wish ARF well and am sure it would achieve its stated goal with the best cooperation of all.

various famous colleges and University like Rajshahi and National University. The teachers of this school are hardworking, dedicated and energetic. Four students got Primary School Certificate (PSC) scholarships in 2014 and six students in 2015. I am very proud of being a student of this school. Following the example of Bangkok Pre-Cadet School, five more schools have been established with the help of LOMEF.



#### ARF'S INCEPTION, ACCOMPLISHMENT AND THE FUTURE

#### Inception



ARF was formed during an Asian consultation held in Bangkok in June 1996. It was a common realization that many NGOs and faith-based organizations were engaged at grassroots and national level development activities with the support of funding agencies from economically developed countries.

The consultation identified 4 priority areas which could be responded to by an Asian initiative: (i) Asia-wide human resource development and capacity building of small scale NGOs, community and youth organizations. (ii) Financial resource mobilization and small-scale funding for children's education, scholarships for needy but committed under-graduate and post-graduate students and support for school building in remote areas. (iii) An International Institute to offer short courses on peace and development studies, provide space for workshops,

seminars, youth and student camps, offer research fellowship to young scholars. (iv) provide humanitarian assistance to disaster and war -affected people in Asia and beyond.

Based on the above mandate, ARF started operation as a registered Thai Foundation with a scope to operate in Asia and beyond. ARF is governed by a board which consists of 5 Thai nationals with the support of an International Advisory Board consisings of 8 members. The Secretariat implements the program under the guidance of the Board and international advisers. Summary of the activities are included in the Anniversary booklet.

#### ARF MAJOR PROGRAMS – AN OVERVIEW

# **Lorraine Robinson – Maeve Coughlan Education Fund (LOMEF)**

Established in 1998, LOMEF support enables children from poor and vulnerable communities to access formal and non-formal education at primary and secondary level in South Asia, Southeast Asia and East Africa. The type of financial support includes tuition fees, school materials such as bags, books, stationary and uniforms, rental payments for school facilities, salaries for teachers/volunteer allowances and teachers training. It also provides graduate scholarship to public college and university students facing financial hardship during their studies.

Since its establishment, the fund has been increased gradually and now stands at US\$150,000 annually to provide educational support for underprivileged children and needy students pursuing undergraduate and postgraduate studies. In 2014, LOMEF expanded its activities to Africa building a nursery school in rural Uganda. Over the past 7 years, it has secured access to education for 16,568 children in 12 different countries namely: Bangladesh, Cambodia, Egypt (for Syrian refugee children), India, Myanmar, Pakistan, Philippines, Nepal, Sri Lanka, Thailand, Uganda and Vietnam. The table below presents summary statistics in the seven year period 2010-2016:

# Humanitarian Assistance and Disaster Response Program in 2011-2016

ARF responds to immediate disaster needs in collaboration with community based NGOs and international aid agencies. Its emergency teams have been assisting in the rebuilding of communities and delivery of critical aid through distribution of essential items in disaster-affected countries since 2004. Through its partners and alumni, ARF reaches out to remote areas to cover the humanitarian needs of the population. In 2011-2016, ARF provided essential supplies to 404,230 people affected by natural and manmade disasters in South and Southeast Asia. Countries include Bangladesh, India, Laos, Nepal, Myanmar, Pakistan, Sri Lanka, Thailand, Indonesia, Philippines and Vietnam.

#### International Institute of Peace and Development Studies (IIPDS)

The institute, hosted by ARF, offers courses and runs workshops across Asia on peace studies, development and human rights. It provides training for peace building, conflict transformation, negotiation and reconciliation. It also hosts interfaith forums and dialogue exchange in order to create practical solutions to pressing social issues. Through these activities, IIPDS aims to create a new generation of peace workers, peace defenders and peace negotiators towards the prevention of conflict and the promotion and sustenance of peace in multi-ethnic, multi-cultural Asia and beyond.

Each year around 150 youth and mid-level professionals from different countries take part in those training courses and workshops offered by IIPDS. In 2016-2010, about 44 events were organized by IIPDS/ARF/AMAN with 10 of them outside Thailand attended by around 1,240 participants. 



#### Assistance to Refugees, Asylum Seekers & Displaced Persons

There is a lack of support agencies offering assistance to help the many asylum seekers, refugees and displaced persons around the region. Working within the universal framework for the protection of human dignity and human rights, ARF offers an advisory service, short terms humanitarian needs, solidarity and assistance to empower asylum seekers. In 2010-2016, ARF provided food aid to 3,400 refugees and asylum seekers in Thailand.





#### **Healthcare Initiatives**

## **NAF Community Hospital in Bangladesh**

In 2014, Namiajn-Aftabi Foundation (NAF) with major financial support from LOMEF, started to build a community hospital project in Harunja village of Kalai sub-district of Joypurhat, Bangladesh. Out of two buildings, the first block is completed and now fully operational. The construction of the first floor of second building has now been completed. The hospital has begun providing treatment with medicine-subsidy to poor patients. The management committee has initiated a process to obtain government permission to make it a full-fledge community hospital. It will serve to provide integrated health awareness and affordable quality health care services through outdoor and indoor treatment and services, and counseling services with special emphasis on mothers, the elderly, children and differently able children. It is estimated that the total number of beneficiaries would be approximately 70,000 per year.





